Points to Ponder- 'Presenting ourselves to God

One tradition associated with the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is Candlemas. This tradition involves the blessing and lighting of candles, symbolising Christ as the light of the world. The candles represent the presence of Christ, who illuminates our lives and dispels darkness. They remind us of the light that Jesus brings into the world, guiding us on our spiritual journey. The symbolism of light in this feast invites us to reflect on the role of Jesus as the light of the world and the impact He has on our lives. Just as a candle illuminates a dark room, Jesus brings clarity and understanding to our lives, guiding us on the path of righteousness. His light dispels the darkness of sin and ignorance, offering hope and salvation to all who believe in Him. As we reflect on the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, it is important to consider the personal and community implications of this significant event. Just as Mary and Joseph presented Jesus in the temple, we are called to present ourselves to God, offering our lives and seeking purification.

Presenting ourselves to God means surrendering our will and desires to Him, just as Jesus was presented to the Father.
